Repent

Too often we judge others by their appearance. We see and understand only the surface. It takes time to get to know others, but we often do not give others the time they deserve. We make snap judgments and rapid appraisals that do not serve ourselves or others well. Sometimes our prejudices and narrow perspectives further cloud our ability to discern.

For Reflection . . .

Why do you think we are so quick to judge others?

What is the single biggest obstacle that prevents you from knowing others well?

Renew

God looks beyond the surface into the heart. God completely sees and knows who we are—foibles, gifts, and capabilities.

While we cannot know another as God does, we ask the Holy Spirit for help. We strive for wisdom, humility, and enlightenment to come to know others as clearly as possible. We implore God to give us a keen eye to light the shadows and dark places within so we might come closer to knowing the truth of ourselves and others.

The witness of Scripture is constant, reminding us that with God, our Shepherd, all things are possible. Even as we walk through the darkest valley, the goodness and kindness of God follows us. Even failures, upsets and difficulties can be a disguised blessing and eventually bring good as we strive to learn what is pleasing to the Lord.

For Reflection . . .

To whom do you open up completely? Why?

How often is your conversation in prayer with God honest and lively? What would help it be this way more often?

Purification and Enlightenment Session

APPRENTICES IN FAITH: A Resource for the RCIA Fourth Sunday of Lent • Year A

Church Teaching: Christ, the Light of the World

Along with "purification," the Church identifies "enlightenment" as the goal of this period in the process of initiation. Christ is the light of humanity, a light to which we are drawn by faith. The Holy Spirit gathers all believers into the light of Christ which shines out visibly from the Church.

A prominent theme in the Fourth Gospel is how God's truth is fully manifested to the world in Christ. The author employs the image of light to convey the informative and liberating character of this truth. At the beginning of this Gospel account, Christ is described as "full of grace and truth" (John 1:14). Later in this Gospel, Jesus himself says that he is "the light of the world" and that whoever becomes his follower will not therefore walk in darkness but in the ways of authentic life (see John 8:12).

There are many ways in which believers, with the help of the Church, come to enlightenment and the truth. For example, in both liturgical or communal and personal (private) prayer, we fix our gaze of faith firmly on Jesus; while at the same time, Jesus gazes back at us. Focusing on Christ, we engage in a type of self-renunciation in order to be purified. Purified, we surrender to his love and enlightenment. The inner person, our heart and soul, is filled, illuminated and fired up by the Word so that we might "see" everything in his truth and his compassion.

Distinctiveness of Church Teaching

Saint Ambrose (340–397) says, "You, too, should come to Siloam, that is, to him who was sent by the Father. . . ." Let Christ wash you, and you will see. Come and be baptized, it is time; come quickly, and you too will be able to say, "I went and washed"; you will be able to say, "I was blind, and now I can see."

Baptism remakes us as adopted children of the light who walk in God's ways. We leave behind the old ways of darkness and sin. In Christ we are called to our best, most expansive, grace-filled selves.

Key Images and Symbols of the Season

SENT—The Anointed One, the Christ, to whom we are joined in Baptism.

WASHED—Healed, made clean and whole, in Baptism.

THE HEART—where God speaks to us most intimately.

BLINDNESS—the willful stubbornness which turns us away from God.

SIGHT—the capability to recognize God's calling.
